




2019 Retirement year. After practising with shorter hours and longer holidays, I made the change in July. It's wonderful.


William Longworth (General Practitioner)

Obituaries

Peter Hewson August 1 1950 to March 16 2017

Written by Dr Rick Lowen incorporating aspects from Dr Mike South's culogy speech in italies:



Peter Hewson joined our medical class in 1969 having excelled at school, cricket, golf. Unbeknown to many. Peter's dad had died the year before, placing considerable responsibility upon him to support his Mum Dorothy, brother Robert and sisters. Jillianne & Anne Peter was a deeply curious student who made his own considerable success in medical school

appear easy and low key. Hence the title "Prot" which he was affectionately called by some of his medical school mates. He possessed a warm and embracing personality that made those who befriended him feel special and appreciated.

Peter's love of bush exhibited itself during his intern year in Canberra where he enscenced himself in and renovated dilapidated shearers quarters on the Clare property outside Bungendore where he also used to horse-ride like he'd been born in the saddle. A short stint as rouseabout on a Captain Flat property punctuated Peter's resident years, prior to him commencing a paediatrics term in Townsville. Around this time Peter's relationship with the love of his life Cathy, (who he'd mot at Canberra hospital) comented, and he resolved to specialize in paediatrics as his career path.

A paediatric training appointment at the Royal Childrens Hospital followed, during which Peter & Cathy resided in Parkville. Upon completing paediatric followship, Peter took up a research position at Cambridge in the UK where he lived for 2 years between 1984-86, Peter's work there resulted in numerous sentinel research papers identifying the hallmarks of serious illness in infants. That scholarship has since been incorporated into a simple 5-point checklist and, another more complex but predictive list new known as BabyCheck. Whilst the former is still taught to Molbourne University medical students and features in a Victorian green baby book given to parenting mums, the latter has been embraced in the UK where it's available as a mobile phone app. Peter's research also insoired further studies by WHO to roll out more innovative approaches for undeveloped countries, to assist identifying serious illness in infants earlier.

Following the family's return to Australia in late 1986, Potor noxt moved to Geeleng where he set up a private paediatric practice linked to ward and after hours clinical service at Geeleng Hospital. Peter not only provided many years of service to Geeleng Hospital as a Paediatric Consultant, but supported many others there as a lead clinician, leacher, menter and researcher. One Geeleng paediatric colleague commented in his eulogy to Peter that he "was the most prominent researcher in regional paediatrics of his generation".

Combining all these facets of work while also completing his MD, bringing up a family and, running a small hobby farm at Gentle Annie (behind Lorne) was an extraordinary achievement. But Pete didn't do things in half measures. He also created a small private music testival at Centle Annie long before the Falls festival began in Lorne and members of that group still meet annually in Melbourne to celebrate that special gift of musical merry-making.

Peter is survived by his wife Cathy, 2 daughters (Kellie & Sophic) and 3 grandchildren (Ruby, Louis & Remy). Peter's larnily and friends still miss him greatly. Peter's life was full and well spent but sadly, prematurely shortened by a neurological degenerative illness. Throughout the latter, Peter exhibited great courage, resilience and was an inspiration to us all. So rest in peace dear friend and colleague:
